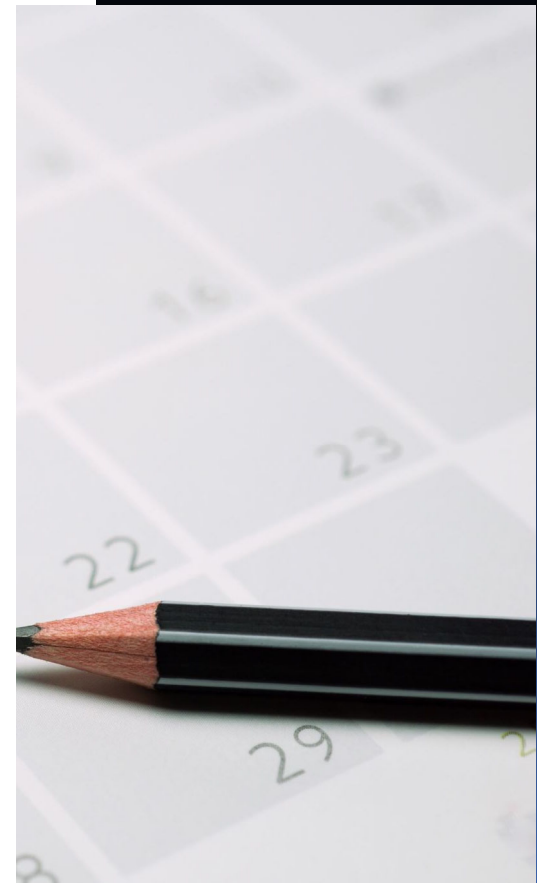

Property Taxes

- The Town of The Pas levies taxes to provide services to the community. The Town collects taxes on behalf of provincial schools and on behalf of Kelsey School Division.
- Tax notices are sent out in June/July of each year and are due August 31st in each year. Taxes paid in August cover a period from January to December of that year.
- There is a 1.25% per month penalty added to taxes that are not paid by August 31st.

1 Mill = \$213,448 in revenue for 2026

How property taxes are calculated

- the mill rate is the tax rate; 1 mill = \$1 per \$1,000 of assessed property value
- Your property is assigned a value based on its estimated market worth **determined by the Provincial Assessment Branch based on prevailing local real estate market conditions**
 - The portion taxed is 45% for residential properties and 65% for commercial properties as per Manitoba Assessment Services.
- property taxes are calculated by taking the **portioned** assessed property value \div 1000 and \times by the mill rate

Example (does not represent actual mill rate)

Residential: (assessed value \$100,000 x 45%) / 1000 x residential mill rate of 10 = \$ 450

Commercial: (assessed value \$100,000 x 65%) / 1000 x commercial mill rate of 10 = \$ 650

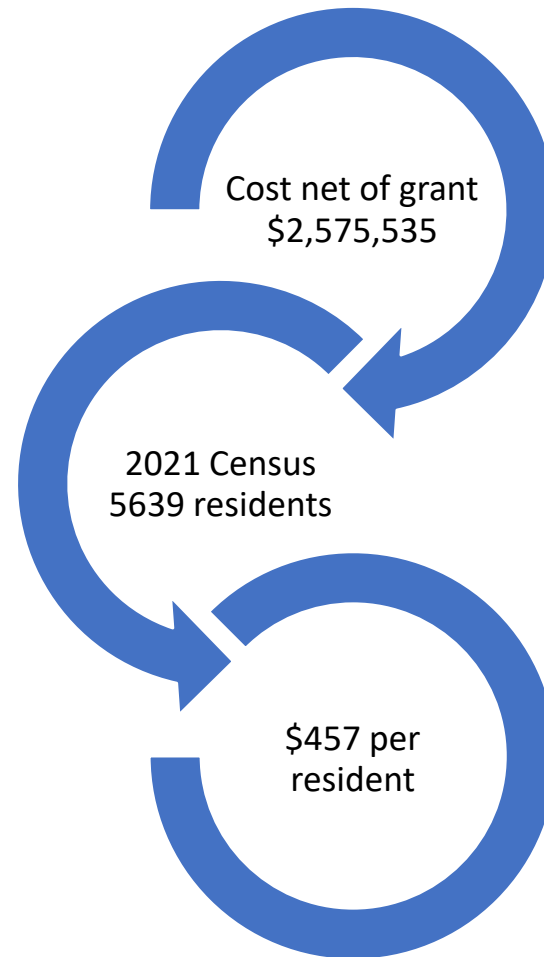

RCMP Costs – At a Glance



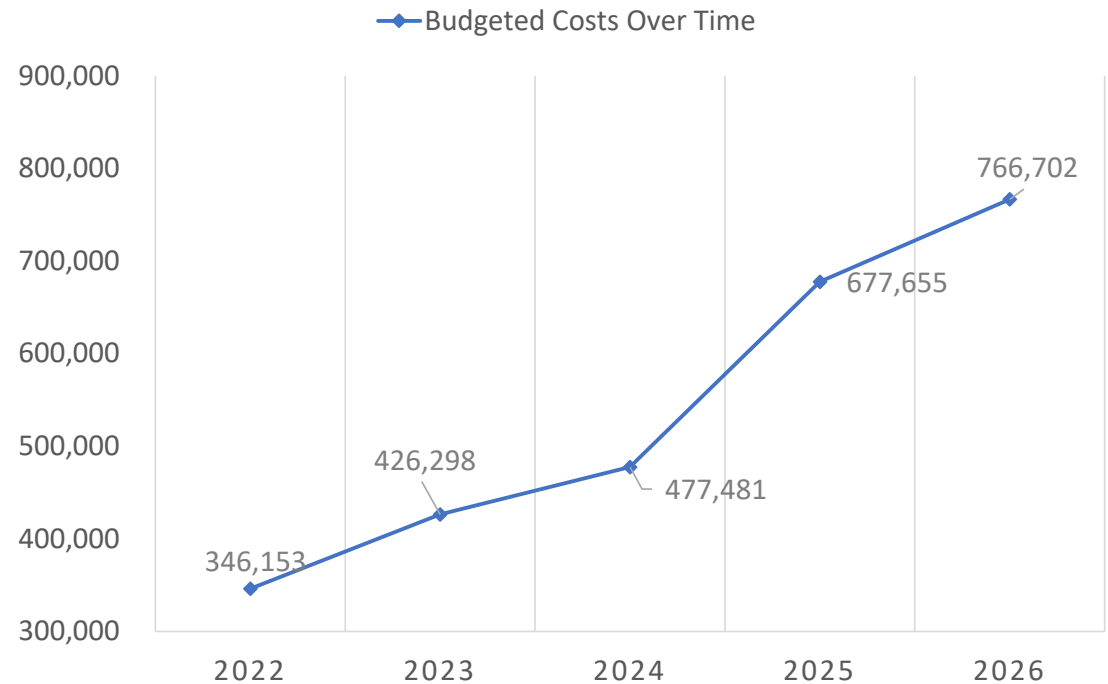

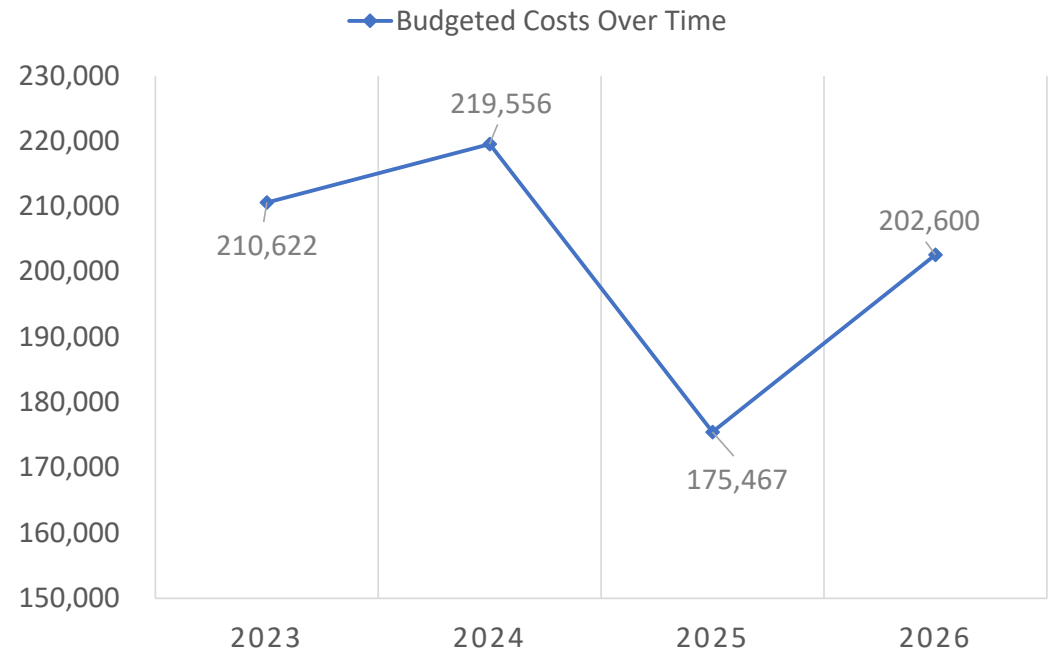

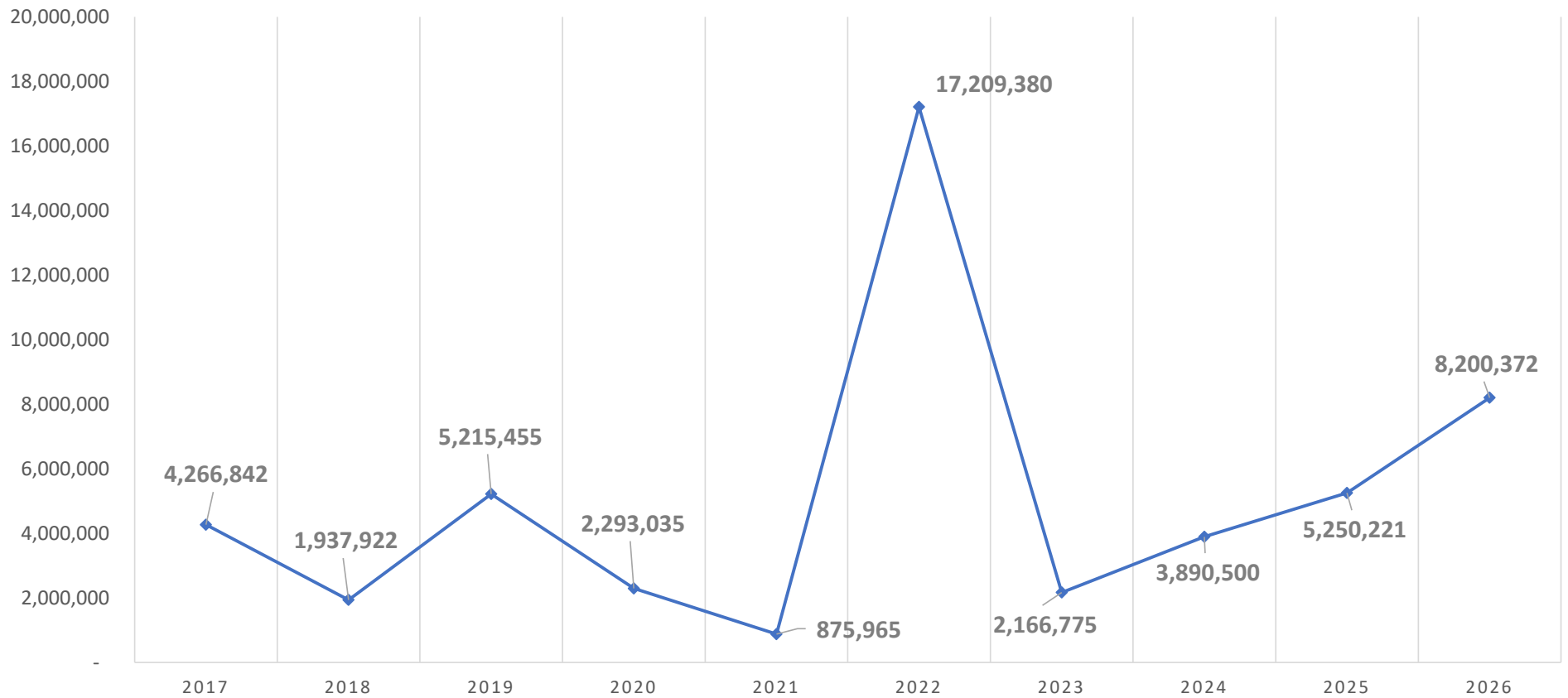

Capital contributions – 10 year Comparison

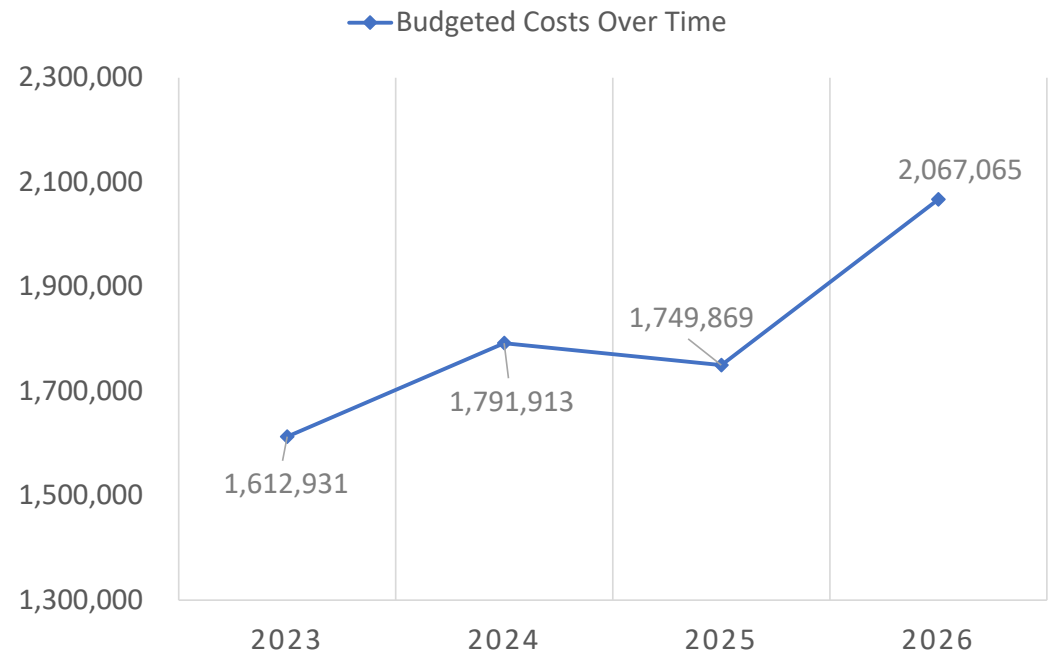
